RECTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Saints of James,



Last week I was going through papers on my desk, and I discovered this image, saved from days gone by. I have always been fascinated by this picture - what do you initially see? Do you see two

faces, or a vase? Or both? Do you have to stare at it a while to shift your perspective to see two different images?

Often in life, we see things as either or; for many people, both and, is not in their mind set. The Easter Resurrection speaks to the possibility of holding two distinct understandings in one reality - Christ is both dead and alive: Christ has died and Christ is risen. What does this mean for us?

In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus instructs the disciples to go and meet him in Galilee. He does not deny that Jerusalem is the source of great pain, suffering and death, but Jesus directs the disciples not to stay in that place; they are to travel to Galilee to join Jesus in his ministry of giving life. Jesus is inviting his resurrected followers to participate in creating a world of life rather than death, leaving behind the despair of

the cross for the hope of new life in the resurrection. A community that had given up on the possibilities for life, that had lost faith in the gospel that Jesus preached, was called back into lifegiving ministry. This is what the invitation to Galilee was all about.

We are Easter people, and we live in that same tension of knowing that Christ has broken all bonds of evil through his death and resurrection, but also seeing evidence of violence, hatred and evil in the world. As followers of the Risen Christ, our mission is to meet Jesus in the "Galilee's" of our lives and join him in the ministry of spreading the Good News of the redeeming Love of God, in word and deed. The appearances of Jesus during the 50 days after his Resurrection, recorded in the Gospels, set a stage of expectation and desire that God's presence can be seen in the ordinary and the material, and we do not have to wait for supernatural visitations. This is called sacramental theology, where the visible and tactile are the primary gateway to the Invisible One. Begin with a concrete moment of encounter, based in this physical world that then reveals the image of God; the purest form of spirituality is to find God in what is right in front of you—the ability to accept what the French Jesuit and mystic Jean Pierre de Caussade (1675-1751) called the sacrament of the present moment.

During this Eastertide of 50 days, may you look at your ordinary life, and be able to see God's presence there; it is not either or, but rather two realities coexisting. The Good News of Easter is

that life always triumphs over death, good over evil,

Alleluia! Alleluia! SEB+

The students ushered in Minimester, an exciting time for all. For some, the day began with focusing on academic improvement, specifically with math and reading. Other students participated in enrichment classes which included leadership, drivers' education, art, books in film and home economics. The day started in the classroom but then transitioned into activities such as the equine program, martial arts, basketball, golf, tennis, art, paintball and unique field trips!

Forward Day By Day

Copies of the May/June/July Forward Day By Day, a daily devotional for disciples, are available for you to pick up in the Parish Hall or downstairs on the counter outside the Parish office. In this devotional, each day of the month, has a scripture passage, a short reflection on the scripture, a reflection question to ponder, and a prayer intention. The Episcopal Community Sponsorship: Afghan Resettlement Ministry

In community the Presence of the Holy Spirit is known. Surely this is demonstrated within what is now formally titled the Episcopal Community Sponsorship. Working with Commonwealth Catholic Charities, eight of our Roanoke Convocation Churches are sponsoring an Afghan family in refugee status. The family consists of a father, aged 36, his wife, 31, their two sons ages 11 and 6 and the father's mother, age 80.

Thanks to our church communities, our family's house is a completely furnished home -- A completely stocked kitchen, living room furniture with dining table, rugs, bedding for all family, all essential bathroom supplies, an iron, sewing machine (the women make their own clothing), vacuum, gas grill and outdoor furniture, laptops, bikes for the boys (helmets included), even a chess set and checker board.

The children are enrolled in school. The father is employed.

Primary medical care begins early May. Grocery shopping with the family occurs every two weeks. Our coordinators meet weekly with the family and our Core Team meets monthly with CCC, and weekly on a team zoom.

English as a second language is being taught to the boys and also the adults by mentors from St. Johns and Christ Episcopal four days a week. To hear the wife reply to my question, "where do you live?" in English brought tears of joy to both of us.

All this has happened by such a powerful, growing force called community forming and working together. It has required so much gracious giving, moving furniture, collaborating to get a job done, and leaving with a sense that something very Holy is happening with this family and within us. There are relationships building here which will ever remain. We are truly helping to grow Beloved Community.

And, it is possible because of all of you, our partners in this ministry: Christ Episcopal, Roanoke; St. John's; Christ, Martinsville; St. Elizabeth's, Roanoke; St. Mark's, Fincastle; St. James, Roanoke; Trinity, Rocky Mount; Trinity Ecumenical, Smith Mountain Lake. We offer grateful thanks and appreciation for all you have given, materially and in yourselves.

Little Free Pantry

Our Little Free Pantry continues to be well used and appreciated. Please continue to stock our pantry with non-perishable foods, personal care items and paper goods. Items that may not be on your list but are welcomed are: bread, crackers, flour, sugar, salt, pepper, oil, powdered milk, tea bags, can openers, and women's hygiene products.

Neighborhood Food Ministry

Two apple trees have been planted as part of our neighborhood food ministry. They are across from the Little Free Pantry and, in due season, there will be apples for the picking. The trees may have apples as soon as this fall. They will be available for our neighbors to pick and eat, and as the supply increases, parish members may want to make apple sauce or apple butter to put in the Pantry. The trees will be blessed and dedicated to the Saints of James who died during the Covid19 pandemic, in 2020 and 2021: Jerry Schaefer, Nan Burnett, Mary Ann Tuggle, Nancy Slaughter, Lonnie Bower, Margaret Bosworth, Bob Wright, Mimi Copenhaver. Blessing date to be scheduled.

In addition, a fruit and vegetable produce stand has been built by Jim McGlothlin so we can share garden produce as part of our pantry ministry. As you have surplus fruit and vegetables from your garden, or if you buy a bit of extra produce at the store, share it with our neighbors by stocking

the produce stand. Produce won't last long in the summer heat, but most of our food contributions are collected in a timely manner.

Thank you to all who continue to stock our Pantry, Saints of James, as well as neighbors who want to support this unconditional, free neighborhood food ministry.
