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Dear Saints of James,

As summer slowly slithers into Fall, as the air looses its oppressive humidity and there is a faint smell of autumn, when the sun sets a bit earlier each day as it moves farther from the Summer Solstice, our rhythm changes, schools reopen and programs resume in parishes and civic organizations. Change is not only in the air, but in our lives, for whether we welcome it or not, change is a constant on our journeys. So, I have been reflecting on change and the seasons of one's life.

There was a man who had four sons. He wanted his sons to learn to not judge things too quickly. So, he sent them each on a quest, in turn, to go and look at a pear tree that was a great distance away. The first son went in the winter, the second in the spring, the third in summer, and the youngest son in the fall. When they had all gone and come back, he called them together to describe what they had seen.

The first son said that the tree was ugly, bent, and twisted. The second son said no – it was covered with green buds and full of promise. The third son disagreed, he said it was laden with blossoms that smelled so sweet and looked so beautiful, it was the most graceful thing he had ever seen. The last son disagreed with all of them; he said it was ripe and drooping with fruit, full of life and fulfillment.

The man then explained to his sons that they were all correct, because they had each seen but one season in the tree's life. He told them that you cannot judge a tree, or a person, or one's own life, by only one season; the essence of who we are – and the

pleasure, joy, and love that comes from a life – can only be measured at the end, when all the seasons have been experienced. If you give up when it's winter, you will miss the promise of your spring, the beauty of your summer, fulfilment of your fall. The man concluded, don't judge a life by one difficult season. Don't let the pain of one season destroy the joy of all the rest.

Sounds like sage wisdom to me. I think we have seasons of our own lives that circle round, maybe not on a calendar year, but as life events unfold. I recently had a birthday, and I received a book, which had been on my wish list: *Aging as a Spiritual Practice*, by Lewis Richmond. I have had to admit to myself, that as the years have rolled by, I have aged, and this book affirms that as we age from birth on, one has the opportunity for new possibilities, fresh beginnings, a wealth of appreciation and a depth of gratitude. With *Contemplative Reflections* for one's personal meditation, Lewis Richmond invites the reader to do some soul searching, to expand self-awareness, remain curious and mentally flexible, and to keep your eyes and ears open for simple pleasures. Every season of nature and of our lives has a gift for us to appreciate. So, I am journaling what I value about being my age, and having stopped to reflect, I find the years have built a firm foundation for being calm, centered, responsive but not over reactive, discerning, and appreciative of stillness. I am so deeply rooted in my Christian faith that I know I will not be toppled when the winds of sorrow blow,

and I can sway with grace, when joy and delight appear for me or others.

I came across a quote by British actress Dame Juli Dench, which I think is insightful for all of us:

- *Don't prioritize your looks my friend, as they won't last the journey.*
- *Your sense of humor though, will only get better with age.*
- *Your intuition will grow and expand like a majestic cloak of wisdom.*
- *Your ability to choose your battles, will be fine-tuned to perfection.*
- *Your capacity for stillness, for living in the moment, will blossom.*
- *Your desire to live each and every moment will transcend all other wants.*
- *Your instinct for knowing what (and who) is worth your time, will grow and flourish like ivy on a castle wall.*
- *Don't prioritize your looks my friend, they will change forevermore; that pursuit is one of much sadness and disappointment.*
- *Prioritize the uniqueness that makes you you, and the invisible magnet that draws in other like-minded souls to dance in your orbit.*
- *These are the things which will only get better.*

May your journey of aging, with its seasons of change, enrich you to be fully your unique self.

OUTREACH NEWS...

The benevolence offering for September goes to the Williamson Road Clergy Emergency Fund. St. James participates with 5 other Williamson Road churches to strengthen our ecumenical bond and serve the needs of the community. This clergy group began in the 1960s and has continued since then. Along with community worship services, and supporting Round Hill Elementary School, our major ministry is the Williamson Road Clergy

Emergency Fund. Each church contributes \$800 annually to our loan fund. This is to provide emergency financial assistance for food, gas, utilities, and short-term housing. The fund is administered through a staff member at Trinity Lutheran Church. There is great need in the Williamson Road area so generous donations are appreciated.

NEWS FROM BOYS HOME OF VIRGINIA . . .

Boys Home was excited to welcome alumnus Derrick Cash back to campus. He offered an incredible testimony of redemption to current students and staff. In the early 2000s, Derrick enrolled and then departed from the Boys Home program three times. Although he was unable to succeed while at Boys Home, a seed was planted. After several years of difficulties, he reached a turning point and committed his life to Christ. During his testimony, Derrick stated, "I am not a speaker, pastor or a counselor. I am you. I sat in that very same seat. Be open to the Boys Home program. Everyone is here to help you. You can choose the harder path or listen to what I'm saying now. The choice is yours. Put your faith first. Christ will take you where you are now. He is not asking for a cleaned-up version."

Derrick's visit was prompted by a social media post by Donnie Costigan, Boys Home's director of athletics and recreation who was requesting new bikes for the current students. After seeing the post, Derrick sprung into

action. He stated, "My philosophy is go big or go home." He raised \$10,000 and purchased bikes, hygiene products, athletic equipment, school supplies, tools, an Amazon Fire TV, laptops and more for Boys Home. He received support from his wife Heather, children Bryson and Josie, Terry Martin from the Buena Vista Sheriff's Office, the Rockbridge community and residents in Rockingham County! Derrick said, "All of the items in the gym are waiting for you. Enjoy! What happened is a gift from God. I am merely the vessel. God can, God does and God will."

Derrick currently lives in Broadway, Virginia. He is married to Heather Cash and has three children. Boys Home is grateful for Derrick sharing his story and for the generous donations. The vision at Boys Home is simple: create a community that inspires young men to positively impact those around them. Derrick Cash has a wonderful testimony that embodies the Boys Home vision.

NEWS FROM OUR SOUTH SUDANESE STUDENT -- DEBRA NYANAKOL . . .

This is a letter from the South Sudanese orphan, Debra, that we have been assisting with her school fees for about 8 years. She is going to school in Kenya and holidays are spent at Hope House, which has a large number of South Sudanese orphans there, under the care of Bishop Peter Youl for the Episcopal Church of South Sudan. Currently we are collecting donations in

our Jimmie Jars for Debra's next term school fees. Here is what she writes:

My name is Debra Nyanakol Deng and I study in Cardinal Otunga girls high school, which is located in Bungonna county (Kenya), which is two hours away from our home. I am sixteen years old. I am in form Two, and I am going on well with my studies. As I am in school, I enjoy learning Biology, Chemistry, Physics, English, Kiswah'li, and mathematics. I like these subjects because whoever I concentrate when the teacher is teaching, that is always very easy for me to understand, and I also don't forget whatever I have been taught, unless I never concentrated when the teacher was teaching. I also dislike C.R.E. since I was in primary school, but I always have to read it.

Apart from my studies, I like participating in debate club. I also wish to be a doctor when I finish my studies. This is because my mother had once asked me because whenever she is sick, it is sometimes hard for her to meet doctors cause it is so much expensive. I love these career because I tend to feel it is life saving. While I was still in the lower classes, I wished to be a writer too because I also wanted to share my stories and life experience with other people. I love reading storybooks because they make me feel good.

I wish to study more than my cousin who is my role model, so that I can inspire my young cousins and even the young South Sudanese girls. I sometimes think that girls lives are being destroyed by early marriages which is our culture. I want to learn till the end of my studies and be the role model of the South Sudanese girls.

Without forgetting my great sponsors who have really sacrificed a lot of me. I am really grateful and since I cannot do much, all I can wish to say is that it is because of you that I have such great dreams and that I wish you could continue supporting me.

The group will continue to meet regularly on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of the month from 6:30 to 8:00 pm, in the Parish Hall. St. James has hosted this ministry for those in the community with mental health illness for 40 years, beginning in 1982.

BECOMING BELOVED COMMUNITY AFGHAN RESETTLEMENT MINISTRY AN UPDATE FOR OUR PARTNERING CHURCHES

It is hard at times to write about love in these times of tension and strife. Dorothy Day wrote, "What else is the world interested in? What else do we all want, except to love and be loved, in our work, in our families, in all our relationships. God is Love."

God's Love is certainly at work within our Episcopal Community Sponsorship! Our ministry has completed its three months partnership with Commonwealth Catholic Charities. We are so grateful for their exceptional mentoring, guidance, support with legal issues and basics for our families during their initial three months in America. We could never have come to where we are without walking at CCC's side.

And now we continue as relationships with our families deepen and are filled with such blessings, joys, and wonders.

Our families, consisting of eleven individuals ranging in age from six to eighty, have progressed in learning English from our ESL mentors. They are learning the intricacies of American financial workings, now having their own bank accounts, checking and automatic deposits and withdrawals. Three of our families' members have jobs which they like and find pride doing. Health care is now provided for all, including two who are at - risk patients. Cultural orientation is a blast when we visit grocery stores or go to Target. The boys take special note of unit pricing and are frugal shoppers. Two of the

four boys begin middle school this fall which will be a significant transition. The two younger boys continue their elementary educations. All four continue to be mentored in ESL and tutoring when needed.

Thanks to the lawyer who helps coordinate this ministry, all eleven people will soon have their asylum applications ready for submission.

Where the future will go remains to discover as we follow family needs and discern the winds of the Holy Spirit. What we most assuredly know is we are in this for the journey.

Mentoring, tutoring, transportation needs, health care will all continue to require support.

Four of our eight churches have largely supported the hands-on support of mentoring, transporting, and meeting with our families. (St. John's, Christ Episcopal, St. Elizabeth's, St. Mark's, Fincastle). Our other four churches remain a vital role in this Sponsorship. (Christ, Martinsville; Trinity, Rocky Mount; St. James; Trinity Ecumenical, SML). Your financial contributions and offerings of material needs will continue to be gratefully received.

Heather Rousseau, photojournalist with the Roanoke Times, is writing our families' stories, how our ministry was formed, and how it has grown into this powerful expression of Becoming Beloved Community. The article will be published mid-August in commemoration of the one year anniversary of Taliban's takeover of their country and the family's harrowing escape.

We want to humbly and gratefully thank every church and its members in this Episcopal Community Sponsorship

for your wondrous support. New and varied volunteer needs are being identified. Contact Jan or Joe to learn more. We are growing in the love of this ministry. We welcome your continued presence.
